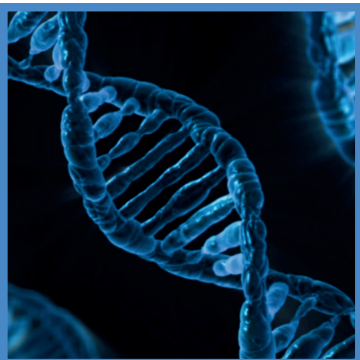


Genetic Facts Sweepstake

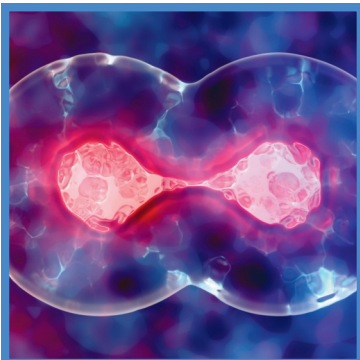

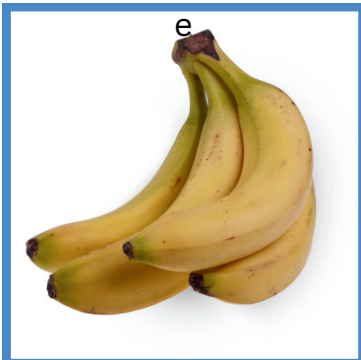
DNA

Our genetic code



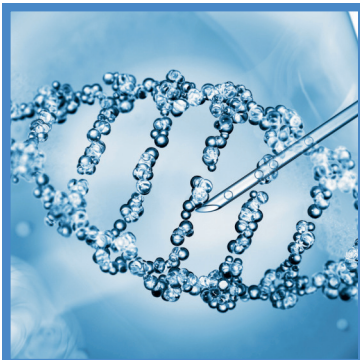
Cell Division

Our DNA is around 98% the same as a monkey



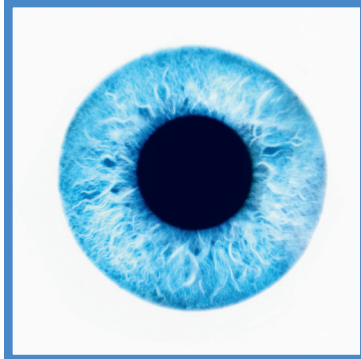
Genetics

Worms have 21% of their DNA identical to humans



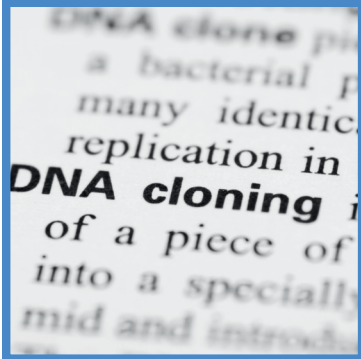
Jeans

Scientists can now clone sections of DNA



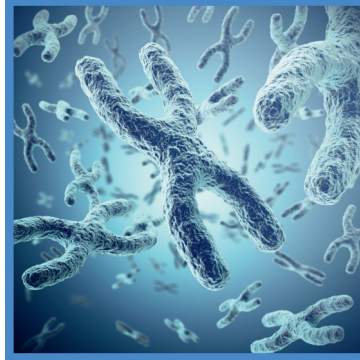
DNA Building Blocks

Nucleotides are the building blocks of DNA



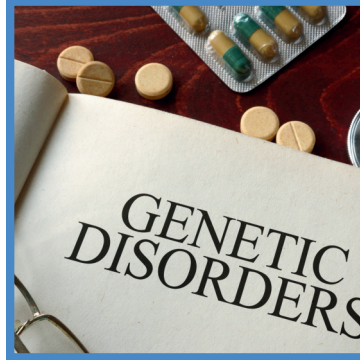
DNA From Parents

Can be caused by a mutation in a Gene



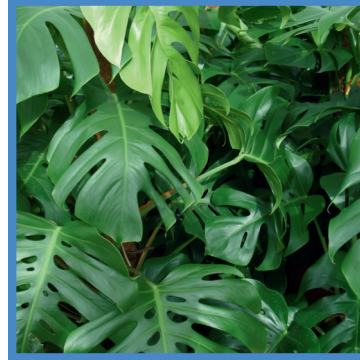

2. This sweepstake is only for use within the UK only.

3. The promoter and the entrants must be 18 or over.

4. Your sweepstake must be conducted as either a workplace lottery, residents lottery or private society lottery and operated in accordance with the relevant rules listed. A workplace or residents lottery means that people are only eligible to enter if they either work in the same premises as the promote or live in the same premises as the promoter. A private society lottery means that people are only eligible to enter if they are either pat of the same society or group (provided it has not been established for gambling purposes) or if they enter into the sweepstakes on the premises of that society or group.

5. You may only display this poster or advertise the sweepstake on the premises relevant to the lottery you are operating (the bit before this bit).

6. A promoter of a private society lottery must have written permission from their relevant group or society (i.e. the boss agrees)

7. The rights of any entrant are not transferrable to any other person (and any attempt to transfer them will be treated as ineffective).

8. Each entrant agrees that, if they win, the promoter will donate the money collected to Jeans for Genes on behalf of the winner.
